It's in a class by itself for quality construction . . . with rear engine efficiency . . . loads of space . . . sharp styling . . . plus new durability features thoroughly tested on a gruelling 40,000-mile endurance run. And all at a new low price!

There's a whole string of reasons why we say this it he hardest working, easiest working delivery van on the road. Take the load compartment, for example (all 191 cubic feet of it!). With the engine, transission and drive train nestled down low between the rear wheels, the wide, high loadspace is unobstructed from front to back. And the driver can pivot from seat to cargo area easily and quickly without leaving the truck.

That unique rear engine design pays off in other ways, too. It puts extra weight on the rear wheels for better traction on all roads, whether the truck is empty or loaded. It gives almost equal weight distribution, front and rear, for easier handling. Handling is improved, too, by cargogentling four-wheel independent suspension.

Add to these basic design advantages the dollar-saving benefits of quality construction—thoroughly tested on a 40,000-mile endurance run—and you'll see why current Corvan buyers are as enthusiastic in praising their Corvans as we are.



Lots of big doors make loading easy. Corvan's big double doors on the right side swing wide to provide an opening 4 feet square and only 16 inches above ground level. Double doors in rear are also standard. If you need the convenience of left side doors to match those on the right, they are available as an extra cost option.


There's extra toughness in the new improved Corvair 95 chassis

The new, improved Corvan chassis means more durability for lower hauling costs over the years. The High Torque 145 Six is equipped with new Stellite-faced exhaust valves and exhaust valve rotators to extend valve life. New chrome-plated top



piston rings add to high-mileage durability and smoother break-ins. New self-adjusting brakes increase safety and cut maintenance expense. New higher rate rear springs reduce lean and sway and increase tire life. And new spherical joints on the front suspension contribute to lower maintenance costs by reducing the need for lubrication to once every 6000 miles.
